

# 2 Reading Quaker Meeting House, burial-ground & art exhibition



A place of peace and beautiful simplicity in the centre of Reading. Quakers have occupied this site since 1715 and the current building is late Georgian.



A strikingly spacious and peaceful interior with original features and a tranquil burial ground and garden including the gravestones of the Huntley and Palmer families. Several Quakers will be unwrapping their artistic creativity and there will be a presentation on 'Quaker iconography' at 10:00, 12:00 and 14:00.

## 3 St Mary's Episcopal Chapel

Self-guided tour of the chapel with special display of "St Mary's Pots", part of the hoard found during the renovation project. The collection has been catalogued and pre-dates the chapel which opened for worship in 1798. The chapel was built on the site of the former County Gaol.

## 4 17 Castle Street

Visit the rooms not normally open to the public in this 16<sup>th</sup> century house, with interesting beam construction, diamond chimneys, carriage mounting block and Victorian staircase. Previously used as an inn, doctor's residence and surgery and once owned by a Reading Mayor. Now a solicitor's practice.

## 5 St. Giles-in-Reading Church

View one of the three medieval churches in Reading. In 1191 Pope Clement III gave the church to Reading Abbey and throughout the Middle Ages, it enjoyed the right of sanctuary. During the Civil Wars of the 17<sup>th</sup> century, St. Giles tower was garrisoned for the King and the upper part was destroyed in 1643. The fabric was restored at the end of hostilities.



# 6 St Michael's Church TilehurstA Celebration of Creativity

A celebration of creativity set in a beautiful historic church, incorporating an exhibition and sale of local arts and crafts and self-guided tours of the building and churchyard. St Michael's dates back to the 12<sup>th</sup> century and boasts a fine Arts and Crafts stained-glass window by William Morris and Edward Burne-Jones, beautiful sculptures and the ornate Jacobean tomb of the merchant and royal jeweller Peter Vanlore. ## 7 St Luke's Church – History and Glass

St Luke's is a Victorian church built to serve the growing population of the Redlands area of Reading. The architect was J.R. Piers St. Aubyn. The Church contains a number of fine stained-glass windows from the C.E. Kempe studio (talks at 11:00 and 14:00). Materials celebrating the church's 140<sup>th</sup> anniversary will be on display with extensive information about the history of the buildings, music and windows. There will also be an opportunity to see some beautiful modern stained glass made by local artist Sal Hunt. Refreshments available.

## 8 Wesley Church Open Day

Celebrating its 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary, Wesley Methodist Church is holding an open day with talks/tours. The Grade II listed building was built in 1873 in the Gothic style, designed by an amateur architect. A new entrance extension was built in 1997. Tours at 11:00 and 14:30.

Foxhill House is a fine example of mid-Victorian architecture. Designed by Alfred Waterhouse to be his own home, it is situated on raised ground near the northern corner of the University Whiteknights campus overlooking the meadows down to the lake. Since 2004 it has been the home of the School of Law.

## 14 Rediscovering Our Forgotten Heritage


## 6 Bridges and a Bridge Too Far!

#### A New Garden at Historic Hillside House

The new garden at Hillside House was created in 2020-21. It is open to the public for the first time during Heritage Open Days 2023. Hillside House was built in 1880 and has belonged to both the Palmer and Sutton (seeds) families. The new garden has been designed by Lloyd Turner and garden designer Gaila Adair, and celebrates the history of the house and is a memorial to the four sons of the Sutton family who gave their lives during the First World War.

## 28 Brock Keep

Come for a tour around the Grade II listed former armoury and gatehouse which is now home to artist studios and a contemporary art gallery. Completed in 1877, it is a fine example of a Victorian keep, built to aid recruitment and to increase local pride. Reading's Keep is one of the surviving few. Since 1980, the keep has provided artists' studios for OpenHand OpenSpace and Reading Space Studios.

# Historic Walking Tours at Silchester Roman City Walls & Amphitheatre

Silchester has its origins as iron age Calleva. After the Roman conquest of AD 43 it became the large and important town of Calleva Atrebatum. Unlike most Roman towns, it was never reoccupied or built over after it was abandoned, so archaeological investigations have given an unusually complete picture of its development. Step into Roman footsteps, learn about how the archaeological investigations have brought history to life and how the city walls history has taught us about life as a Roman.
