

#### **HERITAGE OPEN DAYS IN READING**

Explore Reading's heritage as part of England's annual heritage festival. All Heritage Open Days events are FREE to attend, but charity donations are accepted at some events.

This programme lists nearly 40 events in and around Reading that showcase the rich stories that make Reading such a unique place to work, live or visit.

A number of these events must be pre-booked due to limited capacities. Check the individual event listing to see if you need to book.

Please check **heritageopendays.org** before travelling to check accessibility. Many of these heritage sites have limited wheelchair accessibility and there is full detail of access arrangements on the heritageopendays.org website. The website also provides information on travel options.

#### 5 Architecture Up Close -The Making of One Station Hill

Explore the story behind One Station Hill through an architectural tour, public talk and a visual exhibition showcasing the building's development. Discover how this landmark was designed and built and enjoy panoramic views from Level 15.

## 6 17 Castle Street

Discover this 16<sup>th</sup> century house and the rooms not normally open to the public which boast interesting beam construction, Diamond chimneys, carriage mounting block and a Victorian staircase. It has been used as an inn, a doctor's residence and surgery. Once owned by a Reading Mayor, the building has been used as a solicitor's practice since 1971.



Explore this interesting building which was first opened for worship in 1798. Self-guided tours of the chapel and displays of pots and glassware found in a pit under the floor during renovations.

9 St. Giles-In-Reading

One of the three medieval churches in Reading, in 1191 Pope Clement III gave St Giles to Reading Abbey and throughout the Middle Ages, it enjoyed the right of sanctuary. During the Civil Wars of the 17<sup>th</sup> century, the tower was garrisoned for the King and the upper part was destroyed in 1643. The fabric of the building was restored at the end of hostilities.

#### 10 St Michael's Tilehurst **Photography Exhibition**

An exhibition of photographs set in a beautiful and historic church, with self-guided tours of the building and churchyard. Parts of St Michael's date back to the 12<sup>th</sup> century and it was extensively remodelled in the mid-Victorian era. It boasts a fine Arts and Crafts-stained glass window by William Morris and Edward Burne-Jones. Refreshments will be available.



#### **11** Exploring the Architecture of Georgian Reading



An architectural walking tour of Reading's extensive Georgian architecture by Dr Stephen Gage, Lecturer in Architecture at University of Reading. Reading has over 400 listed buildings from the Georgian period, representing a substantial part of its built heritage, from early C18 houses on Castle Street and London Street to the Royal Berkshire Hospital and Eldon Square in the 1830s.

## Tour of the University of Reading's Great Hall

The Grade II listed Great Hall on the University's London Road campus was designed by William Ravenscroft and Charles Steward Smith in 1905. It was built for use as an assembly hall for the University College, as it was then known. The impressive hall is used for degree congregations, concerts, examinations, lectures and receptions. The guided tour is led by members of The Friends of the University of Reading.

#### 15 Royal Berkshire Archives Tour

Behind the scenes tour with displays connected to the architecture, people and places of Berkshire. Conservation staff will provide details on the work that they do and show people round the conservation studio. #### 16 Tours of Caversham Baptist Church

The church is built in red brick in the Gothic style and is Grade II listed.

#### Crossing the Thames at Caversham talk

A richly illustrated talk from Helen Lambert of
Caversham and District Residents Association telling the
story of Reading Bridge and the old and new Caversham
Bridges. The current Caversham Bridge celebrates its centenary
in 2026 but its earlier bridges date back to the 13<sup>th</sup> century.
In 1911, a new crossing point, Reading Bridge, was built to
create what was in 1923 the longest single span in the UK.



#### 23 RISC Rooftop Garden Open Day

The RISC Roof Garden is a small edible roof forest garden developed to demonstrate sustainability and our dependence on plants. All plants in the garden have an economic use for food, clothing, medicine etc, and come from all over the world. Can fruit and nut trees grow in soil 30cm deep? How does a roof structure take the weight of an actual forest? Find out the answers to these questions and more at our award-winning sustainable garden. #### **24** Tour of Foxhill House. **University Whiteknights campus**

A fine example of mid-Victorian architecture, designed by renowned architect Alfred Waterhouse, Foxhill House overlooks the meadows and the lake on the campus. Waterhouse designed the House for himself and since 2004 it has been the home of the University's School of Law. Guided tours by members of The Friends of the University of Reading.

#### 25 Reading Synagogue



View and hear about a traditional synagogue from the guides who will be present on the day. There will also be a Jewish Living Exhibition which has been prepared by the Board of Deputies of British Jews. The Grade II listed building has undergone a complete restoration of the roof and cupola as a result of a substantial grant. Reading Synagogue is a traditional synagogue in a Moorish Style dating from 1900 and still in regular use.

#### 26 The Architecture of **Alfred Waterhouse**



A walking tour of prolific Victorian architect Alfred Waterhouse's works in Reading, led by Waterhouse expert Dr Stephen Gage, Lecturer in Architecture at University of Reading. Waterhouse lived for a time in Reading and designed some of its key landmarks including Reading Town Hall (1876), Reading School (1868-74), St Batholomew's Church (1880) and Waterhouse's own house at Whiteknights, Foxhill (1867). Please note the walk will finish at Whiteknights campus! Buses are available to return to the town centre.

#### 29 Medieval Reading Walkabout
